

Authors' Biographies

Zoltán Ádám is Assistant Professor at the Department of Comparative and Institutional Economics at Corvinus University of Budapest and Managing Director of Kopint-Tárki Institute for Economic Research. He holds a PhD in economics from Debrecen University, an MPhil in Political Science from Central European University and a Master in Public Administration from Harvard Kennedy School. He was editor of *Külgazdaság*, Kopint's bi-monthly economic journal in 2006-09 and sat on the editorial board of *Beszélő*, a Hungarian liberal political journal in 2005-15.

Attila Bartha (PhD in Economics) is a research fellow at the Institute for Political Science of the Centre for Social Sciences, Hungarian Academy of Sciences and an associate professor at IBS Budapest. He is an editor of the journal *Intersections. East European Journal of Society and Politics* and teaches courses at the Doctoral School of Sociology at Corvinus University, Budapest. His main areas of research are comparative public policy, welfare policy and political economy.

Eszter Bartha, habil Ph.D. Senior Research Fellow, Institute of Sociology MTA TK and Associate Professor at the Department of East European Studies, ELTE BTK. Main research area: 20th century labour history in East-Central Europe. She is the author of *Alienating Labour: Workers on the Road from Socialism to Capitalism in East Germany and Hungary*. She has published extensively in Hungary and internationally on the subject of East German and Hungarian labour history.

András Bozóki is Professor of Political Science at the Central European University in Budapest. He has published books and journal articles in topics of democratization and its discontents, Central European politics, the role of intellectuals in the regime change, the transformation of communist successor parties, and the theory and history of anarchism. He has taught as visiting professor at Columbia University in New York, and at universities of Tübingen, Nottingham, Bologna, Ljubljana, as well as at Smith College, Mount Holyoke College, Hampshire College, and in his native Hungary, Eötvös Loránd University. He has been a research fellow at UCLA in Los Angeles, at the *Wissenschaftskolleg* in Berlin, the Netherlands Institute for Advanced Study, the European University Institute in Florence, the Sussex European Institute, and at the Institute for Human Sciences in Vienna. He was chair of the Hungarian Political Science Association and a founding editor of the *Hungarian Political Science Review*. He is member of the editorial associates of the *European Political Science*, *Journal of Political Science Education*, *CEU Political Science Journal*, *East European Quarterly* and *Taiwan Journal of Democracy*.

Sonja Dragović earned her bachelor's degree in economics from the University of Montenegro in 2012, after studying for a year at the University of Maine, USA, and for one semester at the University of Economics in Krakow, Poland. She obtained a joint master's degree in urban studies in 2015 through the 4Cities programme, which entails a semester of study and practice in each of the programme cities, Brussels, Vienna, Copenhagen and Madrid. She co-authored a book of interviews '*Ženske hronike*' ('Women's Chronicles') in 2014, seeking to show women's perspectives on living in northern Montenegro through the times of post-socialist transition. She lives in Montenegro.

Júlia Szalai (DSc in Sociology). In her teaching and research work, Júlia Szalai has been engaged in studying intersectionalities of class, race/ethnicity, and gender in multiethnic societies across Europe with a closer focus on poverty and social exclusion in the post-socialist societies of Central and Eastern Europe. Her recent studies have addressed issues of structural transformation and the emergence of the post-socialist welfare states. During the past fifteen years, she has been involved in a great number of cross-country comparative studies, and she has been affiliated with a wide range of institutions of acknowledged research centres in Europe and the United States. In recognition of her work, she was honoured by the Scientific Board of the Soros Foundation ('Creativity Award' - 2003), the President of Hungary (2004), and, twice, the Hungarian Sociological Association ('Polanyi Award' - 2005, 2015). On the basis of her achievements in comparative social studies, she was elected by the United Nations to serve a Member of the Board of UNRISD (Geneva) between 2009 and 2015.

Enikő Vincze is professor in sociology at Babes-Bolyai University of Cluj-Napoca, Romania. Currently she offers courses on European social agenda, critical urban theory and methodology of social research. During the 1990s she conducted research on nationalism, ethnic identity politics and feminism. Since 2004 she has participated in and/or coordinated investigations and published studies on processes and causes of exclusion and marginalisation of ethnic Roma in healthcare, education, the labour market and housing, including the examination of intersectional discrimination of Romani women and the political potential of Romania, and as well as of how capitalism and neoliberal governance are connected to spatial, housing and development politics. Since 2010 she has been involved in housing rights and social justice activism.

Ioana Vrabiescu is currently a Fellow at the Roma Initiative Office of the Open Society Institute working on the exclusion of Roma ethnics in Europe.
